Woman, 2 Men Injured Woman Beaten 3 Killed in Fiery Car Crash, In Fire at 10th, South On Way Home, Suspect Held 3 Others Die on Area Roads

6 Routed By Smoke And Flames

A woman was burned and two firemen suffered minor injuries early Sunday in a fire in a three-story brick building on the southeast corner of 10th and South sts.

Mrs. Lucille Benson, 49, occupant of the third floor apartment in the building at 945 South st., suffered second and third degree burns on her left arm when she tried to save some clothing in a closet.

Mrs. Benson and her husband, Edward, 64, escaped down the stairs. The two second-floor tenants, Jack Smith, 70, and his wife, 62, also fled. WIRING BLAMED


